## From the Administrator

### **Recent Pro-Life Activities and Events**

They say that you can only find God in the present moment. This is true. Certainly, we can reflect upon our memories of past events and see how God's Providential Hand has guided us. We cannot find God in the future because it does not yet exist. It is uncertain. This is why it is "useless" to worry, for we are guided by God's Providence. We find God only in the present moment: He is the everlasting "Now."

I write this piece of wisdom because I can get so caught up in what is happening right before me that I forget to see what is up ahead. Things can sneak up on me and catch me unaware. In other words, I need to glance ahead to see what is coming.

The reason that I write this is that I am retroactively writing about a couple of major pro-life events that happened within that past two weeks. On Friday, January 19, tens of thousands of people walked in the 51st-annual March for Life. Thanks be to God, after decades of prayers and sacrifices, the Supreme Court reversed the decision of Roe v. Wade. This was a great victorious battle, but the war is not yet won. In states across the country, the battles continue. While some states are strengthening laws regarding life, other states are doing the opposite. Thus, the need for prayer, sacrifice, penance, and peaceful demonstrations, like the national March for Life or state equivalents, are still needed. We are still facing a fierce spiritual battle, including in our own State of Wisconsin. As the Bishops of the United States stated, life is the preeminent issue, and as Catholics, we do what we can to defend life from conception until natural death.

Lastly, on Monday, January 22, the Church in the United States prayed for the Legal Protection of Unborn Children. It was a day of prayer, fasting, and sacrifice. My Mass intention was for the protection of unborn children. I regret not writing about this in my last bulletin article, to help prepare you for these events. Alas, this spiritual war for life continues on, and every day is a good time to pray and sacrifice for the protection of all human life. Without the protection of the natural and inherent right to life, our other rights do not matter at all.

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.


Visitation of the Sick: If you become hospitalized, institutionalized or homebound because of illness and would like communion brought to your home or just to be visited, please call the parish office.



St. Thomas Aquinas was five years old when he was placed in the care of the Benedictines of Monte Casino. He made great progress in learning and in virtue, despite his young age. When he was old enough to choose his path in life, he gave up everything worldly and planned to enter the Order of St. Dominic. His family was not happy with choice and did all sorts of things to try to break him of his resolve. They even went to far as to send him an impure woman to tempt him away! Obviously, we know that St. Thomas persevered and kept on in his vocation.

Despite his nickname, The Dumb Ox, he was really brilliant. At the young age of 22 he was made a teacher and also began to publish his first writings. By 26, he was a priest and was sent to Paris. He was 31 when he received his doctorate. His greatest work, we know as the Summa Theologica, was left unfinished when he suddenly fell sick and died.

In the case of St. Thomas, it was his own family that tried to sway him off the path that God has chosen for him. How often is this the case for us?

Does our family try to sway us away from doing God's will? Of course, most of the time our family means well and only really wants the best for us. However, sometimes, our family has a hard time understanding how one could possibly be happy being a priest, religious, or otherwise. And, sometimes its not even something as big as being a priest or religious. Sometimes its how we dress, or how often we go to Mass, or getting to confession or even praying.

Do we let what others think or say affect what we do, even if we know it's the right thing to do? As this is the kick-off weekend to Catholic schools, our Catholic school, Sacred Heart, truly keeps the focus on God. He is the center of all that we strive to do as teachers, students, and families. And, as was true of Thomas Aquinas, not everyone understands. We see the great work God used St. Thomas for. Let us pray for all our students, teachers and their families as we await the great work He has in store for them.

### 3rd & 4th with Miss Santas

In third and fourth grade this week, the third graders are learning all about graphs in math, while the fourth graders are working on adding and subtracting mixed numbers and fractions. In social studies we are wrapping up our chapter by working in groups to build a diorama of a French fur trading fort. In Spanish we are finishing our unit on learning about school workers, classes, and seasons.

### 5th-8th Math & Science with Mrs. Flock

This week 5th grade Math is reviewing and testing on the concept of volume, while 6th graders are starting a new unit on the coordinate plane. In Social Studies we are learning about the expedition of Lewis and Clark. Science finds the 7th and 8th graders learning about taxonomy and the domains of life. The 5th and 6th graders are studying the electromagnetic spectrum.

In The Prince and the Pauper, the prince meets the "motley crew" in a forlorn, dilapidated barn. He learns a great deal from the stories of England's beggars & thieves. The 5th & 6th graders were introduced to Mary Lennox, the self absorbed, neglected girl in The Secret Garden. There's so much for Mary- & us- to learn in life.

### Religion with Mrs. Steger

7/8 continued their study on the Sacrament of Baptism by learning the why behind the use of water as well as the Rite of Baptism. This included exorcism, oil and the Litany of Saints. 5/6 continued their learning of the Mass as a Sacrifice, the very same sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross. They also learned that the Mass is a memorial as well. The Mass is such a beautiful mystery.

Atrium students continued working on previous materials as well as learning more about various gestures (movements with meaning) and parable work.

### 4th Sunday in Ordinary Time

### **Reading Reflections**

Our readings today remind us of God's authority. As we reflect on our Gospel, we recognize that God possesses all authority and that we want to give Him all authority. Jesus was teaching in the synagogue on the Sabbath. All were fixed on His words and astonished at what He had to say. Suddenly, everyone's attention shifted to a man with an unclean spirit who began to question Jesus and His authority. Jesus responded, "Quiet, come out of him!" and removed the evil spirit from the man. All were amazed at the healing of this man. Life can sometimes look like the synagogue in Capernaum. We are living as disciples of Christ when we suddenly recognize evil around us - through events in our lives, temptations we are enduring, or by falling into sin. It can distract us, consume our attention, or even cause us to despair. In these moments of trial, we must remember the Healer in our Gospel today. Recall His words, "Quiet, come out of Him!" Jesus has the power and authority over evil, for He has conquered sin and death. He also has the power and authority over us. And when we invite Him to have that authority, He will heal us and help us persevere. Today, we are reminded that God is in control, and we want Him to be in control. He is the loving Healer Who will work miracles in our lives if we give Him the authority to do so
