From the Pastor

Dearest Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

Beginning next Sunday there will be two significant events held at Sacred Heart Church in Cashton: Sunday – our annual Corpus Christi Procession, and the following day, Monday – our next Healing Service.

Our annual Corpus Christi Procession has been an important part of our Eucharistic Witness over the past several years, interrupted only by the covid shutdown in 2020. Why do I say “important”? It is an important witness because when we truly value something we want to make something of a public spectacle of it. Do we not? How often do we hear of someone getting married in secret, or only having a very small wedding party and guest list? Very rarely. When is the last time the Homecoming Royalty’s coronation and connected traditions was closed to the public or not duly noted in the local paper – with pictures? Never. The things we value we do in a very public way.

Thus, it is with our Eucharistic Faith. Has it not been revealed to us that our Lord’s presence in the Eucharist is very real? So real, in fact, that books are written about the many Eucharistic miracles that have occurred over the millennia? Do we believe this? If so, then we should both celebrate and publicly proclaim it!

With this in mind, I hope many will choose to join us in this public witness. If you are unable to walk so far you are invited to pray for those who are walking by remaining in the church to pray. Upon our return we will celebrate Benediction in bringing our public celebration of Corpus Christi to an end.

Finally, we will be holding our second healing service on Monday, June 12. If you are suffering in any way – spiritually, psychologically, or physically – I invite you to join us for prayers of healing. Confession – that great sacrament of healing – will be available along with Holy Mass (every Mass is a “healing Mass” after all), and finally direct, intentional prayers for healing, including the opportunity to be individually prayed for by our priests and healing team consisting of priests, deacons, and laity. It is a beautiful expression of trust and confidence in God.

“Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Trial, or distress, or persecutions, or hunger, or nakedness, or danger, or the sword? Yet in all this we are more than conquerors because of Him Who has loved us.” (*Romans 8:35, 37*)

Sacramental Life

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

It has been awhile since I've posted testimony from the Archdiocese of Detroit's "*I Am Here*" project as part of the national *Eucharistic Revival*. So, here it is. What strikes me about this particular witness is that it isn't particularly extraordinary; in fact, it is quite ordinary. But that is the way it is for most of us: the fruit of a lot of time spent quietly with Jesus in the Eucharist.

In my reorganizing the Tri-Parish Mass Schedule I had in mind the need for this kind of time, thus the Holy Hour before Holy Mass on Thursdays. I had in mind, in particular, the close connection between the Holy Hour asked for by our Lord ON Thursdays because of the close connection with the Last Supper on Holy Thursday which is the institution of the Most Holy Eucharist. I hope those who are able will take advantage of this opportunity this summer and discover what Rhaki McCormick of Guardian Angels Parish in Clawson, Michigan has come to know and cherish in her life in Christ. Enjoy!

It is Jesus, fully present in the Eucharist, who called me into the Church. As a young person, I had never felt like I fully belonged anywhere. This led me to try to "fit in," often in ways that were unhealthy or destructive in hindsight. After longing fruitlessly and ending up in situations that left me wondering why God had created me at all, I began searching for answers.

My first encounter with the mercy of Christ was while I was working at a homeless shelter in California on vacation over Christmas break. I worked alongside a young marine who chose to celebrate his 21st birthday by serving the poor. This was completely different from how most people I knew celebrated this milestone. We handed out toys to children who had very little, and as we ate with the guests, he explained why he had chosen to serve. He introduced me to the sacrificial love of Jesus on the cross.

A short time later, as I continued to search for answers to my questions and try to understand who this Jesus was, my best friend took notice that I had been visiting different churches trying to figure things out on my own. She invited me to Mass at the Newman Center on campus with her the next week. As we arrived, she explained a little bit about why I couldn't receive communion and what to do instead. During Mass, at the elevation of the Eucharist, I had a mystical encounter with Jesus, who told me I was home where I belonged. I entered RCIA that fall, and while there is no end to learning about the faith and growing in relationship with Christ, I was home. What I didn't know, but God did, was that I would lose my father less than a year after that. In calling me to Himself through that encounter in the Eucharist, Christ brought me to Himself knowing I would need His healing mercy and grace in my grief.

His presence through these 27 years has continued to heal wounds and provide comfort in the dark moments of my life. Sitting before the Eucharist now, I continue to find solace in knowing that no matter what else happens in this life, in this world — no matter how angry or sad or lost or broken I am — in Him, I am always home.

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The Most Holy Trinity

The Mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of the Christian faith and life...the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them" (CCC 234). It is one of the mysteries of faith "that are hidden in God, which can never be known unless they are revealed by God" (CCC 237, quoting *Dei Filius* 4). And once this mystery is revealed to us in God's divine goodness, even though it seems an impenetrable paradox — one God in three Persons — we recognize that the reality of the Triune God is exactly what we need...what we were made for.



Jesus, the Son of God

If you look into your heart and consider the kind of god you deem ideal, what you come up with is Jesus. Given the chance to custom order the divinity who best satisfies the desires of our heart, we would design a deity tender and compassionate, whose joy was to accompany us as a friend in our earthly travails. We would want a god infinitely wise, eager to teach us the things we need to know in order for life to be filled with meaning and joy. We would insist on a god who was merciful and ever swift to forgive our sins... one with a special preference for the poor and the needy. We would want a god of perfect peace, promising happiness, blessing us with hope...one who was extravagantly generous and totally giving of self. We would want a god who was in love with us.

But, in fact, when we meet such a man in Jesus Christ, we can't help but to respond the way people in the Gospel do: *Where did this man get all this? Don't we know his father and mother? Isn't this the son of the carpenter?* Which means that the automatic impulse when we meet Jesus Christ is to presume that what makes him so unique and exceptional — unlike anyone else we have ever met — is his Father.

The Son of God exposes our presumption: *You know me and also know where I am from. Yet I did not come on my own, but the one who sent me, whom you do not know, is true* (Jn 7:28). The more we gaze upon Jesus Christ in all his ineffable goodness, the more we are compelled to cry with Philip, *Show us the Father* (Jn 14:8).

God the Father

And Jesus does just that, revealing to us the most tender and attentive Father who knows what we need before we ask him. The Father of Jesus gives good things to anyone who prays to him. The Father turns his Son luminously radiant in the Transfiguration for us to behold — hope for our own transformation in holiness.

"Christ's whole earthly life," the *Catechism* teaches, "his words and deeds, his silences and sufferings, indeed his manner of being and speaking — is *Revelation* of the Father" (516).

But it is especially in the Passion and Death of Jesus Christ that we feel the Father closest to us. Our love of the cross is what makes that closeness permanent. For our divine Savior dying on the cross does not invoke his own godly authority, as would be his right, saying to his crucifiers, "I forgive you." Rather, he takes advantage even of this final agony to show us the Father in the resplendence of his mercy. The Crucified begs, *Father, forgive them*. Why would Jesus ever have agreed to undergo the injustices, the atrocities, the tortures he endured if there were not a Father loving him and inspiring him to love him back with every excruciating drop of his obedient blood?

The Person of the Holy Spirit

Our encounter with Jesus Christ brings about in us a love so great for him that we cannot bear Jesus ever departing from us. Christ's promise to send us the Holy Spirit saves us from despair. The Spirit will remain with us and will keep making Jesus Christ present. He will give us life, conforming us more and more to Jesus. This divine Person will guide us to all truth and meaning and purpose. The Holy Spirit will instruct us in everything and remind us of all that Jesus told us.

We would be lost without a divine Spirit united to our human spirit empowered to imbue us with the ability to rise above our weaknesses and limitations, to change us into persons of courage, and to make us other Christs in the world — exactly what is promised us through the grace of the Sacrament of Confirmation. As Saint Cyril of Alexandria assures us, The Holy Spirit gathers together those who are distinct from each other as individuals, and causes them all to be seen as a unity in himself." And in that otherwise impossible unity — the Church — the Blessed Trinity manifests itself to the world in all God's glorious splendor.

Reading Reflection

Throughout our readings today, we see the amazing truth that the Holy Spirit gives us gifts and guidance in a very personal way. We are meant to use these gifts to build up the Body of Christ in a way that is unique to each one of us. Our first reading, from the Acts of the Apostles, recalls the dramatic moment of the pouring out of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles. "Suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim." Notice how personal and individual is this outpouring of the Spirit. This personalized way of "gifting" the apostles allowed them each to reach different people, sharing with them the "mighty acts of God." Embracing the stewardship way of life means allowing the Holy Spirit to guide us in the best use of the unique gifts He has given us to accomplish the mission entrusted to us. Jesus gives us this mission in our Gospel passage from John. "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." But we must not let this responsibility overwhelm us. Jesus Himself tells us so — "Peace be with you." As this Easter season ends, let us be at peace. And let us resolve to lean on the Holy Spirit more and more as our guide through the stewardship way of life.







For Youth and Young Adults

St. Isaac ministered to the Native Americans in Canada, in a place few Europeans had ventured. He knew that their lives would be so much better by knowing about God. He was patient and taught the people about Jesus and baptized those who needed it.

He came to the aid of the sick as best he could. For some of the Natives, it didn't matter why he was there. After trying to return with supplies, members of the Mohawk tribe captured him and tortured him for more than a year.

He was stripped, beaten, ripped off his fingernails and sawed off his left thumb. He was also burned with hot coals. There were opportunities to escape but he chose to stay with his fellow captives because he wanted to help them too.



At one point, he did escape and managed to find a group who was returning to Europe. They were also cruel to him and by the time he got to Europe, he was nearly dead. After a time of recovery, he knew he wanted to return and he did.

Not long after he returned, he was captured again but this time, the torture was short. The Natives killed him by cutting off his head and putting it on a stake in the village. The rest of his body was thrown in the river.

Do we believe in and love God so much that we would willingly put ourselves at risk to share His message with others? Would we return to a potential situation where we would get attacked again or do we retreat and go in a different direction?
