### *From the Administrator*

How unreflective are we? Not just individually but collectively. Have we forgotten the significance or meaning of things? Do we know what our customs and traditions mean, the richness of its symbolism?

I will grant you that I am "old-fashioned," and I enjoy the traditional things. I noticed that younger people, especially boys, no longer remove their hats indoors, and even more shockingly to me, in the classroom. The origins of this custom originated from Medieval knights removing their helmets to identify themselves. To not do so meant a challenge. I keep my helmet on because I mean to fight you. Since then, removing one's hat symbolizes respect and humility, especially before someone who has a higher authority.

I wonder if the same erosion of traditional habits has also snuck into our etiquette of coming to the church. Is the church building not a sacred space? Is our space of worship not set apart for something different than what happens outside of the walls of the church? Do we not do something different in the church compared to our daily lives?

If we answered yes to each of the questions, then we need to treat the church as such. What are some things that we can do to prepare to come to the church?

1. Read and pray with the readings and prayers for the Mass.
2. Form your own intentions to offer at the Mass upon the altar.
3. Arrive early to allow time for prayer to prepare your heart, mind, and soul.  
Read the bulletin after you get home.  
Parents with children are encouraged to arrive early, but children do work on their own time.
4. Stay focused and not distracted throughout the Mass. If your mind wanders, gently redirect your attention back to what is happening.
5. Stay after Mass for five minutes to pray in thanksgiving.

In today's Gospel, Jesus was zealous about the true purpose of the Temple. It is a sacred place to give our entire selves out of love to Jesus' Father, our Father. The Mass is a gathering of the faithful community, but it is not only a community gathering. It is much more than that. The primary purpose of the Mass is to worship, praise, and adore God. Will this place be the Father's house?

## Sacramental Life

**Baptism:** Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

**Marriage:** Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

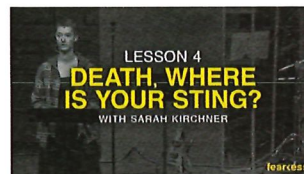
### Liturgical Living | Catholic All Year at Home w/ Kendra Tierney

## **For Youth and Young Adults**

Mercy. We may have some idea what mercy is, but if asked, would we be able to explain it?

Our virtue for the month of March is mercy. The definition given is caring for those who suffer. When we are struggling, we want it to be easy. We want relief, mercy. This relief can come in two ways, physically and spiritually. The Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy give us several ways we can offer mercy to others. Whether we offer food, clothing, shelter, water, etc. or bear wrongs patiently, admonish the sinner, pray for the living and the dead and more, we are doing the works of mercy.

Is it always easy to offer mercy to others? Maybe it's easier for us to offer bodily mercy by giving clothing, food, or water. But offering spiritual mercy can be more challenging. Is it easy to bear wrongs patiently? We are a "quick to react" society. Do we admonish the sinner? I'm guessing we tread very lightly when telling someone that what they are doing is wrong. Of course, it wouldn't go well to walk up to someone on the street and tell them they are sinning, right?

When we attempt to do this, it should be done with love. The ultimate relief from suffering will come from receiving mercy in the Sacrament of Confession. Jesus alone can offer both physical and spiritual mercy. Let us make sure to find Him in this sacrament during this Lenten season. And let us take a good look at our saints this month who will help us learn how we can practice this virtue.

# Sacred Heart School News

## 4K & 5K with Mrs. Klinge

This month we are learning how to best take care of our teeth to make our whole bodies healthy. We got to thinking how things would be different if we lost all our teeth!

- You could only eat soft stuff like cake and cool whip, applesauce and yogurt.
- It will be really hard to talk!
- You could not talk to Jesus very well.
- You can't bite anything.
- You will have to smile with your lips closed.
- Your mouth will hurt.
- You can't eat chips, apples, steaks, sandwiches and lots of other yummy foods.

## 1st & 2nd with Mrs. Balk

How is it already March?? This school year is flying by and the first and second graders have been busy working on multiplication and division and addition and subtraction in math. We read and discussed some stories about the importance of telling the truth – including the classic tale of *The Boy Who Cried Wolf*. We are learning about fossils and clues from our past in science and our Spanish lessons are teaching us the names of some common fruits and vegetables. We have certainly been enjoying this unusually mild weather – you may have even seen some of us outside at recess with short sleeves on – in February!!!

## Art with Mrs. Leis

This week we continued to work on our 3D animals. Everyone seems to enjoy the project thus far and they plan to be completed next week.

## 3rd & 4th with Miss Santas

In third and fourth grade this week, we finished up learning about the solar system, then we worked on a project where we got to create our own planet. The third graders are working on comparing fractions in math, while the fourth graders started a chapter learning about measurements. In Spanish, we ended the unit by playing a game of *loteria* (bingo) to help us review what we have learned before we take the test for the unit.

## 5th-8th Math & Science with Mrs. Flock

Science 5 and 6 are studying mixtures and had the opportunity to separate a mixture. They used magnets, tweezers and the filters to separate the materials. The 7th and 8th graders are learning about the plant kingdom. This week we are concentrating on non-vascular plants and their characteristics. Math 5 continues to master multiplying and dividing decimals while Math 6 is calculating volume and surface area of triangular prisms. Math 7 is moving on to scale drawings using proportions. Math 8 is calculating the volume and area of cones and spheres this week.

## 5th-8th Literature & Spelling with Mrs. Slattery

Everyday we work with words in many ways-spelling, grammar, vocabulary. This week we're putting our words to work in writing stories. In social studies we're dealing with the effects of the Industrial Revolution.

## Religion with Mrs. Steger

7/8 talked about the Eucharist as a sacrifice and how it's the same sacrifice as Jesus on the cross. How important this must be if we have been talking about this for several weeks among the classes.

5/6 started going over the various parts of the Mass. We started with the introductory rites which include the entrance hymn and Confiteor.

Atrium students are getting to know the Good Shepherd more deeply this Lenten season by going over the Good Shepherd parable, among other parables.

We've been taking advantage of the warm weather to continue going outside for PE. We've managed to combine "capture the cone" with burpees and slam balls. A little competition goes a long way.

### **Reading Reflections**

Our readings call us to roll up our sleeves and persevere through the remainder of Lent by committing to a more faithful life with Christ. In today's Gospel, Seeing the misuse of the temple area as a marketplace, Jesus purifies it. He becomes angry at their lack of reverence for God. He spills the money changers' coins and overturns tables, saying, "Take these out of here, and stop making my Father's house a marketplace." Jesus witnessed the way people mistreated the temple — the place to worship God and God alone. He drives out evil and works to purify all that is sinful in that place. This same purification process is what Jesus wants to do for us this Lenten season. He wants to remove all impurity and evil in our lives and hearts so that we may have a proper dwelling place for the Holy Spirit. Let us ask ourselves, what areas of our life need cleansing? Let us name those areas and invite Jesus to purify us. He became man to carry our burdens and wipe away our sins. He has given us boundless mercy, but we must do our part to seek it and commit to living a more faithful life as a disciple of Christ. With this knowledge, let us seek purification from our sins so that our hearts might be a true temple of the Holy Spirit. Since we are only halfway through Lent — there is still time to work through our shortcomings and purify our hearts for Easter morning. But let us not waste another moment. Let us name our shortcomings, seek God's mercy, and invite Him to transform our hearts

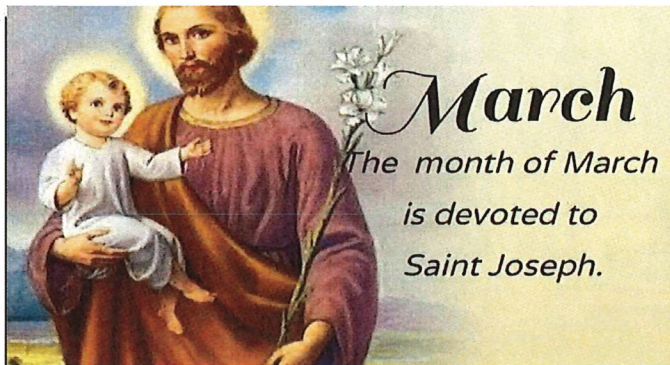
