### *From the Pastor*

Dearest Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

As we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost, it is a joy to be reminded of the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. This Holy Spirit is given to us to heal us and strengthen us for entering more deeply into our relationship with God and for the task of giving witness to God, especially in the *incarnation, passion, death & resurrection*, and the *ascension* of Jesus Christ, his only-begotten Son.

Over the next two weeks we will celebrate the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity and then the Feast of the Body & Blood of Christ (*Corpus Christi*), which gives us the opportunity to first of all recognize the truth of what we have heard over the last several weeks from our Lord: "*the Father and I are one*", and "*I will send you, from the Father, another Paraclete*"; and then, in the Feast of Corpus Christi, the means by which we continue to be strengthened by our Lord's presence for the task before us.

This week we will begin our **new Mass schedule for weekday Masses**. The changes involve Wednesday and Thursday. For the past eleven years I've had two Masses on each of these days. However, since the suspension of the Traditional Latin Mass there has been no need for this. The reason I am choosing to have evening Mass at St. Mary's fall on Thursday is in recognition of the tradition of having an evening Mass on Thursdays in remembrance of the "Last Supper". In the context of our on-going *Eucharistic Revival* it seemed to be a worthy thing to do. This Mass, which has been known as the "Farmer's Mass" since it was established before my time here, will begin at 7:30 pm to accommodate the milking schedule. It will be preceded by a **Eucharistic Holy Hour**. Those who are able are encouraged to come when they can and spend some time in quiet with our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Finally, our annual **Eucharistic Procession** is planned following the 10:00 Mass on Corpus Christi Sunday. We've done this the last several years (except for during the covid shutdown) and it has been well received. More importantly, it is a public witness to our love for Jesus Christ, present to us in the Most Blessed Sacrament. I would urge all to plan on attending. If you don't (or won't) attend the 10:00 Mass, you can gather by the doors of Sacred Heart church about 11:00 am and join in the procession as the Blessed Sacrament comes out the door and leads us down Front Street and then back up Main Street.

### Sacramental Life

**Baptism:** Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

**Marriage:** Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

## *On Living the Vocation to Holiness*

The Feast of Pentecost is the official end of the Easter Season. At the end of this Mass the Easter Candle is extinguished and moved to the Baptistry, lit from here on only for Baptisms and Funerals. Monday morning we begin "Ordinary Time". Of course, there is nothing "ordinary" about time once our Lord has entered into it; and there is certainly nothing remotely ordinary about life lived in the Spirit. Indeed, what was translated (rather badly) in the 1960's into English as "ordinary" is the Latin phrase "*per annum*", meaning "through the year". In Spanish it is "*tiempo ordinario*" which can be translated either as "ordinary time" or "ordinal (counted) time". Given the Latin it seems rather obvious which sense of "ordinario" should be taken.

Why does all of this even matter? Well, it is a matter of how we go about living our life in Christ. What is our touchstone? How do we think about our lives and what we are to do with that gift?

If we are truly Christian, our life revolves around Christ; as the first Christians called it, living according to "the Way". Living this "way" of life begins for us with Pentecost. Thus, with Pentecost as our touchstone for living the "way" of life Christ has marked out for us, we rightly see this time between Pentecost and Advent as always sprouting from Pentecost itself. We are living in that time of Pentecost.

Living in the power of the Spirit, living in that time of Pentecost, is not a matter of "power" as the world sees it. This power which is given to us who are living our lives in the Spirit is given as it was given to our Lord in his earthly life: not for ourselves, but for the works of God Who has given that power to us. Thus, we recognize the "Gifts of the Holy Spirit", not as "presents" given us by God for our own pleasure, but as the "presence" of God given to us as tools to be used for his works among men.

"But, what about MY needs?????" Yes, this can all seem like we are being called to pour ourselves out for others with nothing for ourselves. But, it only seems that way. The Truth is that in pouring ourselves out for others we receive fruits beyond measure.

I wish I could say more, but space doesn't permit. However, we now have until next Advent to explore this. And we will! Stay tuned for next week.

Wow, the end of the year is at hand and the students have worked so hard at all of their subjects.

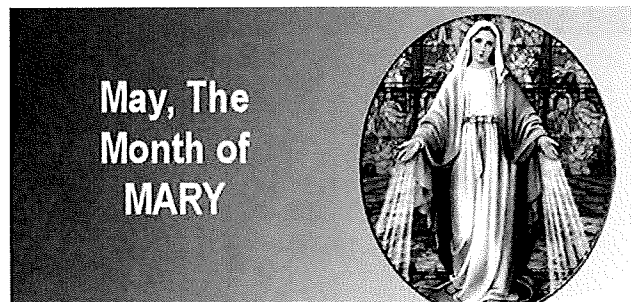

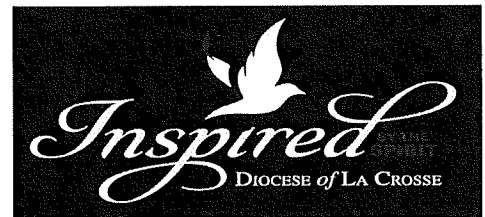
## Mass Intentions

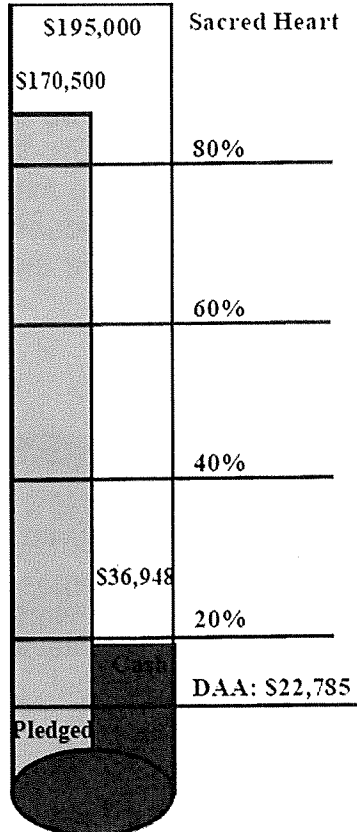

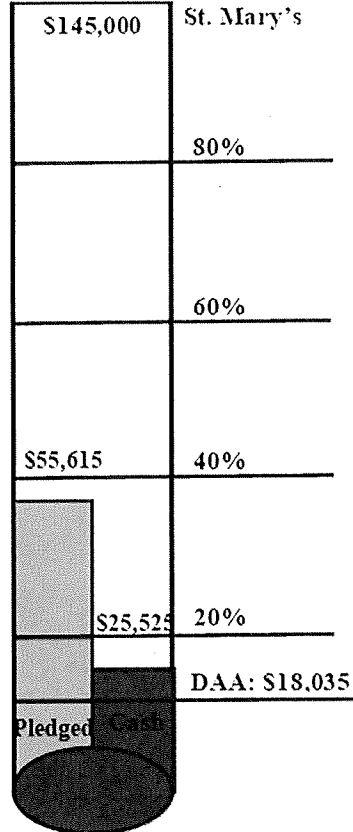

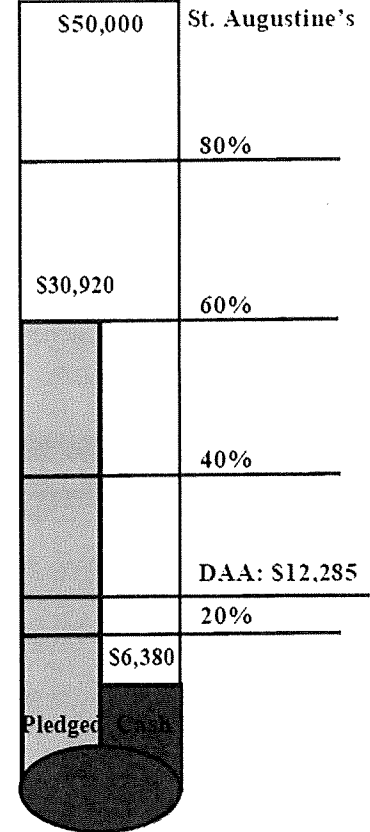

## For Youth and Young Adults

Our final saint reminds us that there is always hope that someone can turn back to God and be forgiven. Maybe we know people in our lives who seem so far away from God that they might never turn back to Him. Or maybe it's something in our own lives that seems unforgivable. Regardless, this story should help you to see there is never a lack of hope when it comes to God.

Bartolo was raised Catholic. He was born in 1841 in Italy. He wanted to study for a law degree and it was at this time that he began to fall away from his faith. He joined a cult and was ordained a satanic priest! It was an old friend who helped Bartolo turn back to God with the help of a Dominican friar, Father Alberto.



Father heard his confession and helped him leave the cult he was so embedded in. He was able to use his law degree to help the poor who needed legal help. He eventually married the Countess di Fusco and together they raised numerous orphans and helped fund many seminarians in their studies.

One thing that Father Alberto had told him was how important the rosary was and how our Lady works for those who faithfully pray the rosary so Bartolo worked to spread devotion to our Lady through this devotion as a way to make up for his past sins. When they lived in Pompeii,

Bartolo started a yearly festival honoring the Rosary which included fireworks, music and games, a regular party! He helped to have a shrine built to Our Lady Queen of the Rosary.

His influence on the spread of the devotion to the Rosary led to Pope John Paul II praising him in his letter on the rosary. Bartolo died at the age of 85, surrounded by many of the orphans he had helped to raise as they prayed the rosary.

How did Bartolo take responsibility for his actions? Was there something specific that he did to make up for his mistakes or take responsibility for his actions? How can we be more like Bartolo?
