From the Pastor

Dearest Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

A Happy Fall Festival to all! This is a wonderful celebration of the Cashton area community and an equally wonderful time to see old friends and neighbors who "come home" for this annual celebration.

The school year is now off to a roaring start; and I'm so grateful to all who make this important tri-parish ministry possible. First and foremost, our teachers, staff, and volunteers; they give so much out of a love for our children and a belief in the mission of our Catholic school which is to not only educate children, but to form them into Christian men and women who desire to "see the world as God sees it" and to then live their lives according to the plan He has revealed for their eternal happiness. Also, parents, without whom we would not have children to welcome to our school, and who show a particular concern for fulfilling the promises made at their child(ren)'s baptism. And finally, the people of the tri-parishes who's continued support of Catholic education makes it possible for our parishes to fulfill more fully their educational mission.

Another important part of our parish mission is that of *charity*, which we fulfill in large part through our support of the Cashton Cupboard & Closet. The Cupboard & Closet is an ALL VOLUNTEER organization established to support those in need in our community. The Cupboard & Closet includes a food pantry and a thrift shop. All of the proceeds from the thrift shop go to support our food pantry operation. Someone asked me last week if there is really that many people in need in the Cashton area. Well, in the month of July the Cupboard & Closet served 338 families which accounted for 1,172 people including 454 children. So, yes, there really is a need. I've been proud to serve on the governing board of this organization for the twelve years. I'm even more proud to count 19 of our parishioners among the 54 volunteers currently serving this important ministry of charity in our community. This wonderful effort in our community has been a particular example of what this community is capable of.

Finally, Don't forget the Mass and Healing service at Sacred Heart on Monday evening. Confessions and Adoration will begin at 4:30 pm, with holy Mass at 5:30 and the healing service to follow.

Sacramental Life

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

This week, as we continue through Pope St. John Paul the Great's Apostolic Letter: **Dies Domini: On Keeping the Lord's Day Holy**, we come now to chapter 2 – **Dies Christi: The Day of the Risen Lord and of the Gift of the Holy Spirit**.

The Holy Father begins by recognizing that the early Church, both East and West, has recognized Sunday as a celebration of the Resurrection – Easter! This is why “it stands at the heart of all worship”. Indeed, he recognizes this as a constant and universal tradition.

In light of this, he recognizes how the Lord's Day is “rooted in the very work of creation and even more in the mystery of the biblical ‘rest’ of God”. He draws this out with a discussion of how the Lord's Day, which is the first day of the week, becomes also the ‘eighth’ day of the week. In this, it becomes also a sign of “eternity”. There is, within this discussion, an accounting of the passage from “Sabbath” to the Lord's Day, particularly in the context of how Jewish Christians migrate from their traditional celebration of Sabbath to their celebration of the Lord's Day.

Interestingly, our Holy Father points out how difficult it was for the early Christians to celebrate the Lord's Day since it didn't line up with Greek and Roman holidays. This is why we see in scripture and in secular sources of the time the need to gather “before sunrise” to celebrate the “breaking of bread”, an early name for what we call the Mass. Yet, he observes, “fidelity to the weekly rhythm became the norm” because “it was based upon the New Testament and was tied to Old Testament revelation.” This is also why the Church, when she became dominant in the culture, always insisted on a seven-day week which begins on the Lord's Day.

Sunday is also “the day of light. This refers to the Holy Spirit which is intimately linked to Christ who breathed the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles on the evening of the Resurrection. This is also linked to the fact that the fire of the Holy Spirit came and rested upon the Apostles and those others gathered in the upper room at Pentecost. Thus, the weekly Easter also becomes the weekly Pentecost.

Finally, Sunday is the *Day of Faith*. This is because of all the elements we have already discussed which come together on this one day. “This is stressed by the fact that the Sunday Eucharistic liturgy, like the liturgy of other solemnities, includes the Profession of Faith.” This emphasizes the baptismal and Paschal character of Sunday. This becomes then, “a special way in which the baptized renew their adherence to Christ and his Gospel.”

For Youth and Young Adults

In September, we are learning about faith. As a review, what is faith? Faith means we believe in God and all that He has revealed. How do we get faith? We first receive the gift of faith at baptism. But this isn't the end of it!

We are responsible for studying and learning and thinking about those things that God has told us in order to increase our faith. Our learning doesn't stop at confirmation. Our prayer life doesn't stop. We may not be attending classes beyond confirmation but we still have an obligation to continue to form our consciences and learn about what we believe (and why).

Our first saint of September is St. Martha. Her feast day is July 29 and

we know that she lived during the time of Jesus (recall the story of Mary and Martha). If you are not sure who Martha is, her brother was Lazarus, who Jesus raised from the dead. Martha believed in Jesus. Unlike some who lived during that time, she believed that Jesus was God. It was because of her faith in Him, that Jesus raised Lazarus from death. She believed that He would do so, or at the very least, that Lazarus wouldn't have died if Jesus had been there.



Are there situations or circumstances in our lives that we know Jesus would fix? Is our faith strong enough to believe that if Jesus willed it, it would be? How can we be more like Martha? Can we imitate her faith in Jesus?

Reading Reflection

Today's readings are all about relationships. Among the many lessons we have learned from the global pandemic is the profound importance of relationships and communities. Our families, neighbors, friends, and parish family need us; we need them to be our best selves. St. Paul gives us simple instructions in our second reading from Romans to guide us in our dealings with others, reminding us what Christ Himself taught: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Love is the overarching principle that guides us to be good stewards of our relationships. In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus further refines this instruction on good stewardship of our relationships, even when they involve conflict. He says, "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother." Jesus teaches us to confront the offending person directly and discretely – to restore the relationship if possible. This is how we steward our relationships even through rocky waters. Jesus also speaks to us of the power and beauty of community life. "If two of you agree on earth about anything for which they are to pray, it shall be granted by my heavenly Father. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." Christian stewards, God has designed us to help each other on the journey toward heaven. Let us take care to steward our relationships well.

The Seven Sorrows of Mary

The Seven Sorrows of Mary are important for us to know and pray. They are all based on scripture and help us recall Mary's role in salvation history. Though the practice of praying the Seven Sorrows of Mary dates back to the thirteenth century, there has been a resurgence of this devotion due to the apparition of Our Lady of Kibeho that took place in the 1980's in Rwanda. It was there that Our Lady urged people to pray the Seven Sorrows. It is said that Mary revealed to St. Bridget of Sweden seven promises to those who will pray these sorrows. After reading the promises, you will surely want to implement this devotion in your own prayer life.
