Dearest Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

It has been an exciting week. We continue through the early days of the new school year; work on installing a new sanctuary floor at Sacred Heart continues; and while the work on the eaves troughs at St. Augustine's is completed, the preparatory work for tuck pointing the area affected by the leaking eaves continues. We mustn't leave St. Mary's out. We are awaiting the re-roofing of the church spire and preparing for work on the rectory anticipated by the diocesan capital campaign.

Many have been quite generous in supporting the capital campaign which makes these many projects possible, along with important work helping to secure the future of our diocesan Church without which there is no parish church.

I thank those who have generously sacrificed for the future of our parish facilities which support the communities they represent. So, please know that I don't take any of this lightly even as I make my own financial sacrifice. I am grateful to almighty God that in the midst of uncertain times many of you have not only given of what you have at the moment, but have also pledged your continued support, trusting God's own continued blessings on you as you make this act of faith.

Even a little set aside on a weekly basis adds up, and it can add up in significant ways.

Again, I thank everyone for the sacrifices that are made for the work of Christ in our parishes and our diocese.

Sacramental Life

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

On Living the Vocation to Holiness

With our third healing service this past Monday, I thought it would be worthwhile to step away from our discussion of Pope St. John Paul II's letter on *Keeping Holy the Sabbath* in order to explain what these services are about.

About four years ago Deacon Sam and I were discussing the need so many have for healing – body, mind, and spirit – and what we could do about it. That led to speaking with Fr. Bob Thorn, a senior priest of the diocese now, who has been involved in this kind of ministry for most of his priesthood. I also engaged my brother priests in the immediate area on the same issue and many of us agreed that we needed to do something for those who were suffering.

Some might wonder, why not "anoint" them? The issue we run into here is that while the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is not so tight as it once was with regards to who is eligible to be anointed (hence the common name of "last rites"), it still doesn't cover those who are not in some way "in danger of death" because of their condition. What to do?

A group of local priests and deacons studied this issue for about a year and then I asked the deacons to form the lay people who had been identified as being interested in this ministry. This resulted in our first healing service last February, assisted by Fr. Bob's team from Wausau. Since then we have conducted two more and will conduct our fourth service on Monday, December 4th.

So, how is this different from the sacrament of anointing? First of all, obviously, it is not a sacrament or sacramental rite – it is a service which makes use of prayer and a number of sacramentals (salt, oil, water, etc.) to put those asking for prayer in a place where their bodies, minds, and spirits are open to the healing God wants to bring to all his children. Our prayers are aimed at healing and deliverance from those evil spirits and conditions resulting from objectively evil acts which open one up to suffering.

This ministry is undertaken with the whole-hearted belief, as shown in the scriptures, that God wants all his children to be fully healthy in body, mind, and spirit. In holding these healing services, we are providing both for God's part and for ours in this act of healing. God communicates his healing to us through the Sacraments of Reconciliation (Confession) and Eucharist, the sacramentals of salt, oil, and water, and the prayers of his priests, deacons, and lay people. We do our part by making a good Confession, receiving the Eucharist in all faith, and allowing the prayers and sacramentals to help us in opening our hearts to the forgiveness of those who have wronged us, as well as the forgiveness of our sins, with faith in the power of God's love and mercy.

The next saint we will learn about is St. Jerome. We celebrate his feast day on September 30 of each year. He lived in Israel during the late 300's. St. Jerome made a major contribution to the continued learning of our faith because of his study of Scripture, which we will learn about today.

Jerome didn't start out as a Scripture scholar or a Christian. He was a member of a wealthy pagan family. To be pagan means they did not believe in God. Jerome studied to be a lawyer and was very smart. Because of his ability to think and learn, he came to know about God but didn't truly believe. Eventually Jerome was baptized and did come to know God in his heart.


After he came to know and love God, he lived as a hermit (all alone) in the Holy Land. The story goes that people saw a lion with him. While he was living all alone, he spent much time studying Scripture. He became so knowledgeable about the Scriptures, that the Pope asked him to translate the Bible into Latin. This way more people could read the Bible with it

written in Latin.

Why is St. Jerome one of our saints for the virtue of faith? What did he do to show he believed in God and all He revealed? St. Jerome, despite not growing up believing or knowing about God, spent much time trying to learn about Him. Even when he learned about God but didn't yet believe truly in his heart, he continued to spend time learning more about Him and His message to us. He didn't stop.

He was willing to do what it took to increase his virtue of faith in his life.

What can do we in our own lives to increase our faith? Is there something St. Jerome did that we could also do in our own lives

The Seven Sorrows of Mary (continued from last week)

2. The Flight into Egypt

And after they were departed, behold an angel of the Lord appeared in sleep to Joseph, saying: Arise, and take the child and his mother, and fly into Egypt: and be there until I shall tell thee. For it will come to pass that Herod will seek the child to destroy him. Who arose, and took the child and his mother by night, and retired into Egypt: and he was there until the death of Herod: That it might be fulfilled which the Lord spoke by the prophet, saying: Out of Egypt have I called my son. Then Herod perceiving that he was deluded by the wise men, was exceeding angry; and sending killed all the men children that were in Bethlehem, and in all the borders thereof, from two years old and under, according to the time which he had diligently inquired of the wise men. Then was fulfilled that which was spoken by Jeremias the prophet, saying: A voice in Rama was heard, lamentation and great mourning; Rachel bewailing her children, and would not be comforted, because they are not. But when Herod was dead, behold an angel of the Lord appeared in sleep to Joseph in Egypt, Saying: Arise, and take the child and his mother, and go into the land of Israel. For they are dead that sought the life of the child. Who arose, and took the child and his mother, and came into the land of Israel. -Matthew 2:13-21

3. The Loss of Jesus for Three Days

And his parents went every year to Jerusalem, at the solemn day of the pasch, And when he was twelve years old, they going up into Jerusalem, according to the custom of the feast, And having fulfilled the days, when they returned, the child Jesus remained in Jerusalem; and his parents knew it not.
