From the Pastor

Dearest Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

A couple of weeks ago I wrote in this column about the necessity for examining the culture in our tri-parish community, specifically with an eye towards our sense of hospitality and "family". I've written previously over the years about the "Kwik-Trip" mentality that has infected so many parishes. This is a mentality that sees the Church as a place we go to, get what we want out of it, and then get going. There has also grown up in our time a practice of "shopping" for a community that suits one's own attitudes, priorities, likes, and dislikes. All of these things have contributed to grave difficulties in forming stable Christian communities which are ready to go out and bring the world to Christ.

So, what do we do to re-build our sense of community, of family? This will be the topic of our next pastoral council meeting, which will take place on Tuesday evening at Sacred Heart – Cashton, beginning at 7:00 pm. Our core council members are asked to do everything they can to be in attendance. Additionally, as we always do for council meetings, members of our parishes are invited to come and discuss this issue with us and help us to find ideas and solutions to this increasingly urgent issue.

Council meetings begin at 7:00 pm with prayer and an introduction to the issue at hand. We then begin sharing ideas which help us to see all sides to the problem as well as beginning to form ideas as to what we might do about it. We then break for prayer before the Blessed Sacrament, giving the Holy Spirit time to inform us. Finally, we come together again to formulate a plan. Pastoral Council meetings generally take two hours in order to provide time for good discussion and the all-important time for prayer.

I hope you will give serious consideration to coming and helping us to work through this significant challenge in the life of our parishes.

"Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Trial, or distress, or persecutions, or hunger, or nakedness, or danger, or the sword? Yet in all this we are more than conquerors because of Him Who has loved us." (Romans 8:35, 37)

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

On Living the Vocation to Holiness

Chapter III of Pope St. John Paul II's *Dies Domine* (On Keeping the Lord's Day) centers on "The Eucharistic Assembly: Heart of Sunday). Given the issues of the past two or three years, and with an eye towards our coming Pastoral Council meeting on Tuesday evening at Sacred Heart, I'm going to start with the end of this admittedly long chapter which addresses *Radio and Television* as a means for participation in Sunday Mass.

It has always been clear that television and radio ministries, and now live feeds on various internet platforms, is a beautiful way for those who "because of sickness, disability or some other serious cause, are prevented from taking part" in the Sunday Eucharistic assembly. Sadly, with the covid shut-down of 2020, some have come to see this form of participation as sufficient for their Sunday worship.

I have many times been greatly gratified, when making Communion calls to our homebound, by the great good these electronic means of participating in Holy Mass can be for those who are unable to attend in person. They are deeply grateful for the opportunity to "see" Mass being offered, and are often edified by seeing the variety of churches and priests from around our diocese, as well as from surrounding dioceses, and through the internet — many places around the world. They also recognize that, sitting in their kitchen or living room, there is something missing. First and foremost, they are unable to receive Holy Communion — our Lord's Body & Blood. Second, they do greatly miss seeing and worshipping with family and friends.

It is for these reasons that the Church has always insisted on personal presence and participation in the Sunday Eucharistic liturgy, and on Holy Days of Obligation as well. Indeed, in his letter, our Holy Father writes: "Clearly, this kind of broadcast does not in itself fulfill the Sunday obligation, which requires participation in the fraternal assembly gathered in one place, where Eucharistic communion can be received."

If we can be out and about for athletic contests and other sorts of social and business gatherings then we should consider ourselves obligated to be in attendance for Sunday Mass. This follows even when we are on vacation. There are any number of opportunities through the internet to locate and confirm places and times for Holy Mass anywhere in the country.

Why does the Church obligate us to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation? Because God, and his Holy Church, knows us better than we know ourselves. Without the regular participation in Eucharistic worship we risk becoming not only our own pastor or pope, but our own god. We are children of a Father who loves us. Let us come and adore Him!

Augustine lived around the same time as St. Jerome in the mid-late 300's. But, Augustine lived in North Africa.




Augustine, by the age of 15, was living with a woman, who would later have his child. Much of his activities centered around unruly behavior. However, Augustine was very smart. He continued to

spend time studying the meaning of life, of which he was unsure. His life changed when he was challenged to read the Bible.

Augustine read the Bible and his heart was changed. He was baptized, sold his property and opened a monastery. He used his knowledge and love of God to fight against the heresies that were prevalent during the day. He also became the one who wrote the most

about Christianity.

3rd & 4th with Miss. Santas

25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading Reflections

Though we can never fully grasp the infinite perfection of God and His ways, a basic knowledge of Scripture reveals that God's logic often differs from worldly logic. Our first reading, from Isaiah, reminds us that God often thinks bigger than us. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the LORD. As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are my ways above your ways and my thoughts above your thoughts." As His followers, we must strive as best we can to think as God does, using our time (and our talents and treasure, too) with eternity in mind. In our Gospel passage from Matthew, Jesus offers us a glimpse of the "Godly logic" of the Father through a parable of a landowner hiring workers for his vineyard. Some workers are called early in the day, others not until very late. Yet the landowner pays them all a full day's wage. This angered the laborers who had worked the longest. Those laborers were relying on human logic and human calculations. They were not thinking as God does. This can happen to us Christian stewards as well. We can grumble and complain (at least internally) when we compare ourselves to others and the sense that not everyone contributes as much as we are to the parish, the neighborhood, or our family. At those moments, we need to think bigger! We must remember that it is a great privilege to have been called by the Father to work in His vineyard. Living the stewardship way of life brings us meaning, depth, and purpose. Let's embrace this Godly thinking and thank Him for calling us to this way of life.

The Seven Sorrows of Mary (continued from last week)

5. The Crucifixion of Jesus

Where they crucified him, and with him two others, one on each side, and Jesus in the midst. And Pilate wrote a title also, and he put it upon the cross. And the writing was: JESUS OF NAZARETH, THE KING OF THE JEWS. This title therefore many of the Jews did read: because the place where Jesus was crucified was nigh to the city: and it was written in

Hebrew, in Greek, and in Latin. Then the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate: Write not, The King of the Jews; but that he said, I am the King of the Jews. Pilate answered: What I have written. I have written. The soldiers therefore, when they had crucified him. took his garments, (and they made four parts, to every soldier a part,) and also his coat. Now the coat was without seam, woven from the top throughout. They said then one to another: Let us not cut it, but let us cast lots for it, whose it shall be; that the scripture might be fulfilled, saying: They have parted my garments among them, and upon my vesture they have cast lots. And the soldiers indeed did these things. Now there stood by the cross of Jesus, his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalen. When Jesus therefore had seen his mother and the disciple standing whom he loved, he saith to his mother: Woman, behold thy son. After that, he saith to the disciple: Behold thy mother. And from that hour, the disciple took her to his own. Afterwards, Jesus knowing that all things were now accomplished, that the scripture might be fulfilled, said: I thirst. Now there was a vessel set there full of vinegar. And they, putting a sponge full of vinegar and hyssop, put it to his mouth. Jesus therefore, when he had taken the vinegar, said: It is consummated. And bowing his head, he gave up the ghost. John 19:18-<u>30</u>

6. Jesus Taken Down from the Cross

And Nicodemus also came, (he who at the first came to Jesus by night,) bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about an hundred pound weight. They took therefore the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths, with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury. John 19:39-40

7. Jesus Laid in the Tomb

And Nicodemus also came, (he who at the first came to Jesus by night,) bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about an hundred pound weight. They took therefore the body of Jesus, and bound it in linen cloths, with the spices, as the manner of the Jews is to bury. Now there was in the place where he was crucified, a garden; and in the garden a new sepulcher, wherein no man yet had been laid.
