

# Parish History

On March 11, 1903, a subscription list was started to build a Catholic church in Norwalk. Because August Brieske contributed the largest sum of money, the parish was named for Saint Augustine. Mr. Brieske also donated the Saint Augustine statue that still graces the main altar of the church.

Land was purchased for \$400 from August Rakeman and the first frame church was erected. With pews donated by Sts. Peter and Paul Parish, at Pine Hollow, Mass began being celebrated in late 1903. Thanks to another subscription list, bells were purchased and installed in March, 1904. St. Augustine Catholic Church was formally dedicated on May 24, 1904.

The church was struck by lightning and burned to the ground in 1916. While the new church was being built, Mass was celebrated in Veith's Hall. The new church was completed in 1918 and dedicated on May 28 of that year. In 2002, the interior of St. Augustine Church was completely repainted.

In 1995 the Quad Parish was born – made up of Sacred Heart, St. Mary's Ridge, St. Augustine's and St. John the Baptist in Summit – with a single priest serving all four parishes. We are fortunate to have an associate pastor and deacon to assist with Masses and ministries.

### Cemetery Fund \$5,000


To provide for the year-round care and maintenance of our cemetery.

### Lay Retirement Plan

25%

Although the Diocesan Lay Retirement Plan has significant funding, it is not enough to cover the retirement needs for the 2,300 participants in the program based on their service given through January 1, 2005.

Holy Cross Seminarian Education Endowment 20% Currently, the Diocesan Annual Appeal provides only one-half of the \$660,000 necessary to fund the annual costs for educating our seminarians.

### St. Joseph's Priest Fund, Inc.

15%

Additional funds are needed to ensure that the Diocese can continue to meet the basic needs of our retirees who have served the Diocese.

### Diocesan Loan Repayment

24%

A priority for the Diocese is to repay funds borrowed from the Diocesan Deposit and Loan Fund and the Diocesan Plant Fund.

### Holy Cross Diocesan Center Renovations 6%

The Holy Cross Diocesan Center was built in 1951, and presently many of the heating, ventilating, air conditioning, and control systems need upgrading or replacement.

#### Catholic Charities

5%

Catholic Charities of the Diocese of La Crosse has a need to establish an Emergency Services Client Aid Endowment, which will be used for direct aid to individuals and families who are facing severe economic hardship and who are living in poverty.

#### Youth Ministry

5%

Bishop Listecki is committed to supporting the ongoing formation of our youth. By creating an endowment trust, additional funds will be available annually to help parishes begin new youth ministry projects and enhance their current programs.
