From the Administrator

Jubilee 2025: Pilgrims of Hope

The first Jubilee Year was celebrated in the year 1300. For a while, it was celebrated every 100 years, then every 50 years, and now every 25 years. Jubilee years are special times of prayer, celebration, and pilgrimage (at first, to Rome). The last ordinary Jubilee Year was the year 2000, organized under Pope St. John Paul II, and the last extraordinary Jubilee Year was 2016, organized under Pope Francis as a Year of Mercy.

The next Jubilee year begins on December 24 of this year, and it will be known as the "Pilgrims of Hope." Pope Francis definitely has recent (last 5+ years) global events in mind. The logo consists of four people holding each other as the front person holds onto the Cross. The bottom of the Cross, which is an anchor, is plunged into choppy waters. There is a lot of meaning in these symbols.

The choppy waters reflect the reality of life. Life is hardly smooth sailing on calm waters. Considering the breezy conditions this week, taking a boat onto these choppy waters would be a bold adventure. However, at times, we must endure the choppiness of life. This is why we must face and cling to the Cross that saves us. The Cross is our anchor in life, and the anchor has long been known as a symbol of hope. We anchor our hope in the promises of God, namely that of eternal life, which we celebrate this Easter season of the Resurrection of Jesus.

The four people are pilgrims. This is a reminder that our final destination is not the world but Heaven, to which God calls us. Since our time on Earth is only for a brief time, we are pilgrims. Again, we are pilgrims seeking our eternal homeland secured for us via the Cross. There are four people to represent all people coming together from the four corners of the world. We are not created to be solitary creatures but to come together in fraternity, solidarity, and in communion. Although we ground our faith, hope, and love in abundance to God, we must seek to help each other and to receive the help that we need.

There are plenty of extraordinary events happening in the Church. In the United States, there is the Eucharistic Revival, whose final year coincides with this Jubilee Year. Partake in these special opportunities as you are able as I will do my best to keep you updated. Let us renew our love and devotion to the Blessed Sacrament, in Whom we place all our hope as pilgrims.

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.


Visitation of the Sick: If you become hospitalized, institutionalized or homebound because of illness and would like communion brought to your home or just to be visited, please call the parish office.

For Youth and Young Adults

St. Anthony of Padua is the patron saint found of lost items. Anthony had originally joined the Augustinian Order but left to join the Franciscans after 5 of them were martyred (died for the Faith). He was hoping to also die a martyr. Anthony had the ability to preach the Faith in such a way that even the most innocent would understand it. Therefore, Pope Pius XII made him a Doctor of the church in 1946.

His nickname was "hammer of the Heretics" because of the way in which he was able to speak the Truth. There were times when the heretics wouldn't listen to him preach so he would go and preach to the fish, not because the fish were listening but because he wanted to give glory to God by professing the Faith with his whole heart and mind.

He died at just 36 years of age. Over 300 years after he died his body was exhumed (dug back up) and although his body was found to be corrupt (decayed), his tongue was not. The preaching that came from his mouth was so perfect God left his tongue intact.

Here are a couple variations of the quick St. Anthony prayer.

*St. Anthony, St. Anthony, please come down, something is lost and can't be

- *Dear St. Anthony, I pray, bring it back without delay.
- *Something's lost and can't be found. Please St. Anthony, look around.

How can we speak the Truth? We are all called, as Christians, to do so, but on a practical level, what does this mean for us? Would our actions show others that we are Christian? Do we stand up for the Church's Truth? Or are we quiet? Do we invite our friends to join us for Mass on Sunday? Or do other things such as sports or our own tiredness take precedence? What can we do to speak the Truth this week, whether with our words or our actions? How does the virtue of justice play into this?

3rd & 4th with Miss Santas

In third and fourth grade this week in social studies we read about the Erie Canal and the National Road and why these were constructed. In science we started a new unit reading about where living things live. In math the third graders are learning all about geometry, while the fourth graders are working on decimal numbers and measurements.

5th-8th Literature & Spelling with Mrs. Slattery

April is poetry month. Poems say so much with so few words. Therein lies their beauty. We're enjoying memorizing some that are fun like "The Tale of Custard the Dragon" by Ogden Nush & "The Embarrassing Episode of Little Miss Muffett" by Guy Carrly. We're also mastering 1 of Robert Frost's worthy poems. "The Road Less Taken."

5th-8th Science & Math with Mrs. Flock

This week the 5th and 6th grade Science class is studying minerals and the identification tests that determine them. Using these tests we identified several minerals in class. The 7th and 8th graders are moving on to mollusks, arthropods, and echinoderms this week. After dissecting worms last week they are looking forward to sea stars! In Math the 8th graders are working on solving and graphing inequalities, the 7th grade is solving combined probability problems, grade 6 is reviewing estimation operations of large numbers, and grade 5 is finishing up a unit on graphing and statistics. After completing two chapters of the Civil War we are moving on the Reconstruction of the Union in Social Studies.

Religion with Mrs. Steger

7/8 finished their chapter on the Sacrament of Matrimony, a sacrament of service. There is a two-fold purpose to marriage: mutual love and procreation. The man and woman work to get each other to heaven but also to welcome children lovingly from God.

5/6 began their final part of the book on the "last things". Their chapter was on the particular judgment. At the end of our earthly life, we will see the balance of good and evil in our lives and know with clarity our judgment (heaven, hell or purgatory). We know the road map so it's up to us.

Atrium students continued their work. Some students learned further about the Mass and the Good Shepherd while others worked on some bigger works.

Reading Reflections

On this fourth Sunday of Easter, we hear that Jesus is the Good Shepherd, and we are His sheep. Today's readings call us to reflect inward - do we allow Jesus to shepherd our lives? In our Gospel, Jesus reveals His radical love for us. He says, "I will lay down my life for the sheep." Jesus tells us that we are His. We can compare this relationship to that of a loving parent to their child. The parent gives without much in return, and if any evil came near the child, the parent would do anything, even lay down their life for their baby. We are Christ's — even more so than a child is to a parent. He created us and sustains our lives each day. Evil persists in our world, so Jesus willingly laid down His life for us at Calvary for our salvation. He is our Good Shepherd. whether we remain in His flock or go astray. But just as a baby is happiest in the arms of a parent, so too are we happiest in the flock of our Shepherd. And just as sheep go astray, we stray from God, test our limits, and even follow false shepherds. Thankfully, our Shepherd is a Good Shepherd, and He laid

down His life for us, knowing every sin we will ever commit. Therefore, let us examine our hearts and return to our flock. We don't even need to find the way. He is right there, always waiting to guide us home. Let us look inward this week and ask ourselves, 'Who is my Shepherd?' and 'Have I gone astray?' Name the areas in your life that you have neglected. Ask Jesus to bring you home. Pray for His mercy, seek His forgiveness in sacraments, and again


