From the Administrator

Adoratio et Reconciliatio

As you probably suspect right now, I enjoy etymology. I really like to know the true sense of a word, especially since the English language is ever coming up with new words and new meanings to words. It is good to understand the fruits of a word by its roots.

The word "Adoration" comes from the Latin word "Adoratio." The Latin word can be split into two parts. The first part "ad-" means "to" or "toward," and the second part "os" means "mouth." Adoration in the general Catholic sense is "an act of religion offered to God in acknowledgment of His supreme perfection and dominion and of the creature's [our] dependence upon Him." Our acts of worship and praise, especially in Mass, are acts of adoration. A specific type of "adoration" is the period of communal prayer during which the Blessed Sacrament is exposed in a monstrance. This is adoration that flows from our Adoration at Mass as a way to show our continued love for our Lord in prayer.

Notice the intimacy of what Adoration is! It means "mouth-to-mouth." It is like CPR or two lovers kissing! Now, please do not kiss the glass of the monstrance on the altar during Adoration. However, recognize what the Church encourages you to do and to have with God. Go, and be with Jesus intimately in the depths of your spiritual life. Talk to Him about anything as two lovers do. Love Jesus with the fullest confidence that He loves you! Be close to Him knowing that He is always close to you.

The next word "reconciliatio" has a similar intimacy to it as "adoratio." Obviously, it means reconciliation, and, in the case of the Sacrament, it is the confession of one's sins to God and then being absolved from those sins through His Grace. "Reconciliatio" can be broken down to "re-," which means "again;" "con," which means "with;" and "cilia," which means "eyelashes." In the fullest sense, "reconciliation" means to be "with eyelashes again," or that you have turned back to God and can see each other eye-to-eye again. Again, notice the intimacy and nearness of this word. To ask God for forgiveness is to be humble enough to turn oneself back to God and to see Him again. Furthermore, our God is not a distant God but one Who seeks to be near you, eyelash-to-eyelash and mouth-to-mouth. Will you dare to be near Him like that?

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Reading Reflection

In our readings this week, Eldad, Medad, and the man driving out demons were all doing God's work. They had been entrusted with a gift and used it to glorify the Lord. For instance, Eldad and Medad used their gift of prophecy to spread God's word, and the man driving out demons used his gift of healing to alleviate suffering. Joshua and John should have responded with joy and appreciation for each other's gifts and talents. We often see others' strengths as our weaknesses in parish life, the workforce, or even our families. Jesus calls us to remove sinful thoughts and attitudes from our lives. The next time we witness someone being a good steward of God's gifts — rejoice! And continue to examine how you use your gifts and talents. Take time for self-reflection and ask yourself, 'Am I using my gifts and talents to the best of my ability? Am I being a good steward of what God has entrusted me?' We do not want to end up like the rich in our Second Reading from St. James. They stored up their riches to the point where they withheld wages from their workers! They clung tightly to the pleasures and luxuries the world offers and put them in front of God and their neighbor. They misused the gifts God bestowed on them. We must keep this in perspective as we journey as Christian stewards. We do not live for this life but for the next. He has given us time daily, countless talents, and numerous treasures. Are we using them for His glory? This week, when we witness other people in our lives using God's gifts, instead of becoming jealous or critical, let's take a moment to reflect on what God has gifted us and how we can offer it to Him for His glory. This introspection can help us understand our purpose and contribute to the community.

For Youth and Young Adults

On October 22 we will celebrate the feast day of St. Pope John Paul II. If I can choose to focus on just one aspect of JP II's life, if that's even possible, it is that of communion. How does the dictionary define community or communion? A basic google search tells me that community can mean a group of people living in a particular place or having something in common. Or, it can also mean a feeling of fellowship with others, as a result of sharing common attitudes, interests, and goals. Communion, then, can be defined as a sharing or exchange of intimate thoughts or feelings. Can one have communion without community first?

Why don't you get your act together?" He first showed his true love and then with great mercy helped to guide those people back to where their hearts were longing to be – with Holy Mother Church.

How can we, as a parish community, be more like JP II, whether young or old? When we share the goal of heaven, what can we do to help each other get there? Should we cut down those who with great love try to help us reach that goal? Or do we choose those people and activities who will help us get there?

After completing our unit on underhand throwing, the focus on this next unit will be overhand throwing. Since we only had one class this past week, we practiced the fundamentals of overhand throwing.

4k & 5k with Mrs. Klinge
