From the Administrator

Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, Part Two

With Election Day fastly approaching and early and absentee voting has begun, it is now the time to form our consciences before voting. It is important to know what the Catholic Church teaches regarding faithful citizenship, such as our moral and civil responsibility and duty to vote, and to study the positions of the candidates and their respective parties. Once again, I exhort you to take the time to read the USCCB's document Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship. It can be found online at usccb.org.

Our conscience is God's inner voice inside of us that makes judgments of reason by which we determine whether an action is right or wrong. Thus, it must be formed intellectually and strengthened willfully. Our conscience is not a justification for whatever we want nor a mere feeling. This gift of God is what we use to listen silently to God guiding us along the narrow path of Truth, Goodness, and Beauty, the transcendental qualities of Who God is. Through the gift of our conscience, we come to love God above all things and to love our neighbor as ourselves.

Therefore, if we get to the ballot box to vote without knowing sound Christian principles and who the candidates are, how can we expect to make a wellformed and conscientious vote? It would be neglect of one's duty and responsibility to make such important decisions and choices without due effort. A player cannot play the game well without knowing the rules and practicing before the day of the game. This is called foolishness.

I would like to conclude by reiterating the U.S. Bishops' preeminent issue facing us Americans today, which is the protection of the dignity of the human person by protecting the right to life from conception until natural death. Unfortunately, in America, this issue has become increasingly more complex, especially with political polarization, the widespread use and easy access of social media, and advances in technology. In many ways, we are treating each other less like human beings made in God's image and likeness.

Of course, promoting the dignity of the human person needs to be addressed in many areas. Fundamentally, it means to protect those who are vulnerable and marginalized in society. This begins with the child conceived and in a mother's womb, whom the Church has deemed as the most vulnerable. We are reminded that God Himself, the incarnate Word, Jesus, humbled Himself to be in the Blessed Virgin's womb and to enter our world as a vulnerable child.



Reading Reflection

In today's Gospel, we hear the story of a man who sought guidance in his spiritual journey, like many of us. He ran up to Jesus and asked Him what he must do to attain eternal life. Jesus said, "You are lacking in one thing. Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." It says the man went away sad because he had much. We might cringe when we hear this story because it is sad — this man was so close to becoming an active disciple of Jesus but instead turned away. We also might cringe because we can all relate to the struggle of letting go of something we hold dear. This story is not just about the man in the Gospel but could be profoundly applicable to our lives. Jesus states, "It is easier for a camel to pass through the eye of a needle than for one who is rich to enter the kingdom of God." One of the metaphors for the 'eye of a needle' was a tight passageway into Jerusalem that people had to enter to get into the city. For their camels to pass through, they had to remove whatever the camel was carrying; only then could they enter. This metaphor illustrates the difficulty of fully letting go of our material or emotional attachments to embrace Jesus's teachings. Looking at our lives, we can most likely think of something we carry tightly. Maybe it is possessions—material goods or money—like Jesus references in our Gospel. Or perhaps it is something less material, like status, pride, or control. Jesus doesn't want our stuff — our job promotions, designer house, or bank account. He wants us. So, we must be willing to strip those things from our lives to reach Him. It might seem difficult, but the outcome will be more than we could have imagined — a life filled with His peace and the ultimate treasure in heaven.

St. Augustine Exterior Renovation

At the most recent Finance Council meeting for St. Augustine, it is agreed that exterior work on the church building is necessary. There has been much delayed maintenance, which is part of the cause of the rainwater leaking in just a few years ago. Completing the work on the outside (repairing and painting the bell tower, gutters and downspouts repair, and caulking the windows) will help to prevent any further damage to the church building. Yes, it is a costly project (approximately \$81,000), and we are looking at raising \$25,000 in the near future before we can even begin taking action toward signing a contract and scheduling a company to work on it in the Spring of 2025. One of the saints that will help us learn more about the virtue of studiousness is Edith Stein. She was born in Germany and her "big moment" happened while she was at a friend's house. She happened upon a book about St. Teresa of Avila (a nun, mystic and tue of studiousness. Doctor of the Church) and Edith stayed up the entire night to finish the book.

Edith was born to a Jewish family and from a young age it was clear that she was very smart. But, by the age of 13 she was doubting that God even existed and gram each week to help you learn. Pick up the Bible stopped practicing any form of her Jewish faith. Eventually she started to study philosophy and started to become fascinated by the Catholic Church. After much study and thought, she was baptized into the Church. She entered a Carmelite Order and took on the name Sister Teresa Benedicta of the Cross.

The Nazi persecution forced her to take refuge. However, she was eventually captured and sent to a concentration camp where she was killed in a gas cham-

We see that although Edith had some challenges believing in the existence of God she didn't stop trying to learn what the Truth was. She continued to learn and study. She tried to find the answers she knew she was searching for and didn't quit. Edith is just one of our examples this month who show us the vir-

What will we do this month to continue to learn more about our Faith? Some ideas follow: get the Hallow app and learn about saints, ways to pray, and so much more. Log in to Formed and view a new proand start reading a Gospel. Check out the kiosks in the back of the three churches and grab a CD or book that looks interesting.
