From the Administrator

November is the Month for All Souls

With our weather this summer season, namely the early wet season and some beneficial rain now a good month and change ago, the leaves on the trees delayed in changing color. Of course, as I write this article a week in advance, I am totally prepared to be raking leaves this weekend. Also, all the crops are very brown and so is the manure replacing the crops.

Anyway, I mention these things to signify that we are in the season of dying and nearing the season of death. Of course, winter has a beauty and a charm of its own if one knows where to look. Dying and death are not bad things. There are things in us that we need to let die so that we may live more fully and freely. Because of Jesus, our death can lead to eternal life with Him. This is the hope that Jesus gives us through His Resurrection.

In the month of November, the Church encourages to pray in a special way for the souls of all the faithful departed who are in Purgatory, who are destined for the fullness of this hope. It is a Spiritual Work of Mercy to pray for them. Purgatory is the place for souls who die in God's grace and friendship and in need of purification so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven (CCC 1030). One analogy for Purgatory is the front porch. Before we enter the full glory of Heaven, we must first wipe and clean the mud off our soul before entering the pure, pristine holiness of Heaven.

We are united as one Church, one mystical Body of Christ, with Jesus as our Head. Our desire is to join our brothers and sisters in the Church Triumphant (the Saints). We pray for our brothers and sisters in the Church Suffering (Purgatory). We continue the fight here on Earth as the Church Militant.

We begin November by celebrating All Saints' Day. On this day, we honor all the Saints, known and unknown. Then, we celebrate the Commemoration of All Souls on November 2. This is the day that the Church prays for all the souls in Purgatory. Let us make a special effort this November to pray for the souls of the faithful departed, especially our family, friends, and parish community.

May the souls of the faithful departed rest in peace.

Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.



Reading Reflection

Our Psalm today, "The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy," sheds light on our glorious Gospel reading about the healing of the blind man. Bartimaeus. We can learn a lot from Bartimaeus about our relationship with Jesus. Many of us struggle with something from which we need healing—physical blindness, illness, addiction, unhealthy habits, anger, or sin. Do we confidently cry out to Jesus in our weakness, knowing He will help us? Often, we begin to, but then a voice in our thoughts tells us to doubt and encourages us to stop trying, like the crowd in our Gospel. Although that voice is persistent and intense, we are called to cry out all the more. Bartimaeus's story is a testament to the power of persistence in faith. If Jesus can hear one voice in a crowd of many, He can listen to our direct prayer to Him in our hearts. Our Gospel story closes with the miraculous moment when Bartimaeus is healed. The conversation with Jesus was simple. Jesus asked Bartimaeus what he would like Him to do. This man, blind for who knows how many years, desired sight. His request was humble and straightforward, showing us that we don't need elaborate prayers or grand gestures to reach Jesus. Jesus responded, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." He was healed and continued to follow Christ. Bartimaeus did not have to do much to become healed. All he needed was his undoubting faith. Whatever we are struggling with in this life, Jesus asks us to have faith in Him. This faith is not just a belief but a powerful force that can move mountains. It's a force that can heal, strengthen, and guide us. As a result, we will remain steadfast in our relationship with Christ and have the strength to keep going. Although we might not be healed, Jesus still hears our confident cries. Through our faith, we will indeed be healed in the next.

When he was just five years old, Thomas's parents sent him to a monastery. Even at that young age, Thomas was quite smart. He would often ask questions such as, "What is God?" His parents had very high goals for him. They wanted Thomas to be the head of a monastery someday, which was a big and important job. However, God had different plans for Thomas. He encountered the Order of Preachers, which we know as the Dominicans.

Thomas's parents were very upset with his choice to join the Dominicans because the Dominicans were a very poor community and that meant that Thomas would be a beggar instead of a powerful abbot or superior of a monastery.

Thomas was very quiet in his classes, so quiet that other students called him the "dumb ox". But Thomas wasn't dumb at all. His teacher, St. Albert the Great, told the students that one day Thomas's voice would be heard around the world.

We know that Thomas was one of the great thinkers and writers of our Faith at the time. It is said that one day Jesus visited Thomas and said, "You have written well of me. What would you have?" And Thomas replied, "Only you Lord."

How did Thomas show that he had the virtue of studiousness? If we were asked the same question as Thomas was, would we be satisfied with only the
