Baptism: Because we believe in the ordinary necessity of Baptism for salvation, it is customary that newborns be baptized as soon as is practical, usually within a month after birth. Parents need to attend baptism preparation with Deacon Sam prior to scheduling a baptism. Please contact the parish office for details or to register.

Marriage: Couples should contact the Pastor at the time of formal engagement or at least eight months prior to the desired date of the wedding. In the case of a mixed marriage, the non-Catholic party must arrange to receive instructions about the Catholic faith prior to the celebration of the sacrament.

Blessing of Churches for Christ King Weekend

Mass for Sunday, November 24, is the Solemnity of Jesus Christ, King of the Universe! This blessing will take place following the 6:00 p.m. Mass at St. Augustine, the 8:00 a.m. Mass at St. Mary, and the 10 a.m. Mass at Sacred Heart.



Reading Reflection

Today's readings starkly contrast the joy of the holiday season, which is fast approaching, warning us instead of dark times ahead and our inevitable judgment day.

The first reading from the prophet Daniel describes a time "unsurpassed in distress since nations began" and warns that "many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake; some shall live forever, and others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace." The second reading, from Hebrews, speaks of Christ who "waits until his enemies are made his footstool."

However, when we firmly establish for ourselves as individuals — as a family and as a parish that we will give God the first and best portion of our Time, Talent, and Treasure — the warnings we read in the Scriptures today should be no cause for alarm. Instead, we can view these words as a source of encouragement — "Keep Calm and Steward On," no matter what comes our way.

One of the blessings of a stewardship way of life is the peace it brings in challenging times. Whether in our homes, workplaces or even our beloved Church itself, we can take great comfort in knowing we have a concrete plan to maintain our priorities properly. And when we put God first in all aspects of our lives, we will experience the peace that He gives, surpassing all understanding

For Youth and Young Adults

As we continue to learn about humility (accepting your limitations, those things we aren't so good at, as well as our God-given talents), we learn about another saint, Saint Pio of Pietrelcina. Most of us might know him better as Padre Pio.

Padre Pio was born in Italy in 1887 and lived until 1968. He is best known for his interesting spiritual gifts. What were these interesting spiritual gifts? For one, Padre Pio was blessed with the stigmata. The stigmata, in case you don't know, is the wounds of Christ. Padre Pio had the wounds in his hands and feet as though he was also crucified on a cross. These wounds were very painful and they also bled.

Another of his unique gifts was his ability to read souls. This special gift allowed him to help those who went to confession to him. These people were able to make a very good and thorough confession that they might not otherwise have made because Padre Pio was able to see those things in their souls that they had either forgotten or were unwilling to confess.

Padre Pio was also given the gift of being able to cure physical illness. Because of all these great spiritual gifts that he was given, some people called him a living saint. Others got jealous of him and accused him of things. During the time of the investigation regarding these accusations, Padre Pio was unable to say Mass publicly, to hear confessions or to hang out with lay people (those who were not priests or religious).

Although Padre Pio knew he was innocent of any wrongdoing, he obeyed orders knowing that if God wanted him to use these gifts, it would be so. And, he recognized that these gifts were not his alone or because of some ability he had, but that they were gifts given to him by God Himself.

Padre Pio is a model of humility because he recognized that God had given him certain abilities that were very special. What gifts do we have? Do we acknowledge that God has given them to us? Do we use these gifts to further God's kingdom or do we use them in other ways instead? Do you have gifts that you need to grow in? How might you do that?

5-8 with Mrs. Flock

This week the 7/8 Science class is reviewing and testing on our unit on Darwin's theory of natural selection and evolution. In Math the 5th graders are finishing up a unit on multiplying fractions and reciprocals. Math 6 is finishing a unit on speed and unit rate while grade 7 in moving on to ratios after testing on solving equations. Grade 8 is solving uniform motion problems.

5-8 with Mr. Kuhn

For both classes, in English we have begun practice for the Christmas program. For 5/6 we also have begun learning about adjectives.

For Social Studies for 5/6 we are looking at the development of the church and new testament. For 7/8 we finished our studies on the Germanic kingdoms.

For Science in 5/6 we are studying genetics and the passing of traits, and Mendel and Punnett squares.

3rd & 4th with Ms. Santas

In third and fourth grade this week, we learned about different types of rocks and what they can tell us about Earth's past in science class. In social studies, we learned about the French and Indian War. We are at the end of our 2nd unit of Spanish for the week, so we took a test this week to wrap it up.

1st & 2nd with Mrs. Balk

Our social studies chapter has been looking at communities and how communities have changed over time. The first and second graders spent some time discussing what Cashton and going to school may have looked like 100 years ago. Here are some of our thoughts:

- 100 years ago there was no electricity so people used candles a lot.
- 100 years ago houses did not have metal roofs and the roofs were flatter.
- 100 years ago students had to carry baskets to school because they didn't have backpacks.
- 100 years ago there were no washing machines so people washed their clothes in the river.
- 100 years ago there were no T.V.s or laptops.
- 100 years ago teachers wrote on the boards with chalk and there wasn't a lot of paper.
- 100 years ago there probably wasn't hot lunch and if there was it only cost 25 cents.
- 100 years ago people wore clothes that looked different and there were nuns for teachers.
- 100 years ago phones looked much different and had to stay in one place.
- 100 years ago there wasn't running water in sinks and people had to carry water for the bathtub.
- 100 years ago people rode horses to get places.

Art with Mrs. Leis

This week in art the students made decorations for the upcoming trivia night fundraiser. It proved to be an excellent team building exercise where the students needed to work together to accomplish a goal. We hope you get/got a chance to challenge yourself and others with a fun night of trivia while checking out the students hard work.

Religion with Mrs. Steger

7/8 finished up a chapter on the first thousand years of Church history. It was a time of persecution and the rise of many great saints.

5/6 started work on the Annunciation and the Visitation. They couldn't imagine not being able to talk like Zechariah. If you don't know the story, ask one of them.

3/4 had a chapter on what happened next in the lives of the Israelites. They learned that Joshua took over after Moses. They also learned about Samson and his strength from God and the story of Naomi and Ruth.

Atrium students continued working on previous works and the 2nd graders learned a new work on gifts. It will be interesting to see how they continue working with that.
